COURSE OBJECTIVE

The objective of this course is twofold:

- 1) to familiarize students with the basic concepts of public policy analysis, hence the reference to the 'vocabulary' in the title and
- 2) to gain operational knowledge of two discursive dimensions of public policies: their grammar and narratives.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

By completing this workshop, students will learn the **basic concepts** of policy analysis and how to use them appropriately in their own study and writing.

In terms of skills, students will acquire an operational understanding of **two theory-informed analytical tools**: the Institutional Grammar Tool and the Narrative Policy Framework.

Finally, students will learn how to work in groups to code text manually and how to present and discuss their findings with other groups.
