



## Study Track “European Interdisciplinary Studies” Academic Programme

### Why follow the Study Track “European Interdisciplinary Studies” (Natolin)

Students interested in taking a broader, cross-disciplinary view of transatlantic affairs can pursue their interests by choosing from a wide array of courses at both the College of Europe and The Fletcher School. They will gain expertise in European integration processes, EU external relations and transatlantic affairs and learn to provide imaginative solutions to today's most pressing and complex national, regional and global challenges by adopting a multi-disciplinary, contextual and multicultural approach.

### Students starting at the College of Europe

Students of the MATA programme who choose to join the “European Interdisciplinary Studies” study track during their studies at the College of Europe will be trained to think beyond disciplinary boundaries and to understand the broader historical, regional and global context of the EU integration process and transatlantic affairs. Interdisciplinary training in EU history, Central and Eastern European history, EU institutions and decision-making, European economic integration, EU law and geopolitics is provided during the first semester.

In the second semester, students can choose from four Majors to gain in-depth knowledge in European public affairs and policies, the EU as a global actor, European neighbours and the European Neighbourhood Policy, or European history and civilization. These studies will then be complemented by coursework on international affairs at The Fletcher School.

### Semester 1

During their first semester at the College of Europe, MATA students in the study track “European Interdisciplinary Studies” who start the MATA programme in Natolin will follow **two of three** non-assessed “Introduction to European Studies” compulsory courses: “Introduction to the History of European Civilization”, “Geopolitics” and “L’Histoire de la Construction européenne” (if students possess a sufficient knowledge of French).

They will then choose **four out of five** compulsory courses (“Central and Eastern Europe in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century”, “The EU in its Neighbourhood and the World”, “The EU Legal Order”, “EU Institutions, Decision Making and Policies”, “European Economic Integration”) **or three of these compulsory courses and two other assessed courses** from the following list: “State and Society in 20<sup>th</sup> Century Political Thought”, “State and Economy”, “Religion et Politique dans l’Union européenne”, “L’Europe centrale, ses voisins et l’Union européenne : histoire, politique et sociétés”, “La Construction d’identités nationales en Europe, XIXe-XXe Siècle”, “L’essence de la culture européenne”.

Students will also follow the non-assessed cross-semester seminar “Research Methodology” and may follow the non-assessed cross-semester seminar “Leadership in the European Union”. They will participate in the first-semester study trip. They may also follow the EIS language courses.



In addition, students follow the joint course on “US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs”, which is an integral component of all study tracks within the MATA programme and brings together all MATA students from both institutions. During the first semester, this course is primarily lecture-based.

## Semester 2

In their second semester at the College of Europe, MATA students in the study track “European Interdisciplinary Studies” have the opportunity of specializing in **one of four majors** (EU Public Affairs and Policies; EU as a Global Actor; EU Neighbours and the European Neighbourhood Policy; or European History and Civilization). They follow **one compulsory core course** and **four optional specialist courses** in their chosen major.

Students may also follow non-assessed compact seminars in their chosen major, as well as workshops and simulation games. They will participate in one of the study trips organized in the

### Semester 3

Students will complete a **high-level internship** related to transatlantic affairs of ideally four months, but at minimum three months. Students who start the MATA programme at the College of Europe are expected to do their internship in the United States.

### Semester 4

At The Fletcher School, MATA students in the study track “European Interdisciplinary Studies” will select **4 courses** (between 26.5h and 32.5h each) from any of the three divisions: International Law and Organizations (ILO); Diplomacy, History and Politics (DHP); and Economics and International Business (EIB). They may also cross-register and substitute one of these four courses by a relevant course from Tufts University or Harvard University.

In early April, students will hand in their **Master’s thesis** on a topic of transatlantic affairs.



## Students starting at The Fletcher School

Students of the MATA programme who choose to spend their first year of studies at The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy will focus to a larger extent on international relations and slightly less on European interdisciplinary studies than those students who begin their studies at the College of Europe.

During the two semesters at The Fletcher School students have to choose at least one course from each of the three divisions ('breadth requirement'): International Law and Organizations (ILO); Diplomacy, History and Politics (DHP); and Economics and International Business (EIB). Some courses are particularly recommended, subject to availability during a semester, since they help prepare students for their study track at the College of Europe.

### Semester 1

At The Fletcher School, MATA students in the study track "European Interdisciplinary Studies" will follow **4 courses** during the first semester. One of these four courses is the compulsory joint course on "US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs", which is an integral component of all study tracks within the MATA programme and brings together all MATA students from both institutions.
