



## Study Track “European Political and Governance Studies” Academic Programme

### Why follow the Study Track “European Political and Governance Studies” (Bruges)

Students can diversify their studies of transatlantic affairs with a course programme offering in-depth study of the EU’s institutions, governance structure, and policy areas, both internal and external. This provides advantages to students desiring to work in EU and transatlantic affairs in the future by providing a comprehensive knowledge of the EU’s policy priorities and complex institutional operations.

### Students starting at the College of Europe

Students of the MATA programme who choose to join the “European Political and Governance Studies” study track during their studies at the College of Europe will be specializing on the institutions and policies of the European Union for one year. Students learn the political, economic, and legal foundations of European integration, with the chance to specialise in specific institutions and policy areas. This includes policies and institutions related to transatlantic affairs, which will then be complemented by coursework on international affairs at The Fletcher School.

### Semester 1

At the College of Europe, MATA students in the study track “European Political and Governance Studies” will follow **3 courses** during the first semester.

They will take two compulsory courses, “Politics and Policies of the European Union” and “The Political Economy of European Integration”. These courses are designed to familiarise students with the political and economic rationale for European integration and introduce them to the EU’s main institutions and policy areas.

Students also follow the joint course on “US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs”, which is an integral component of all study tracks within the MATA programme and brings together all MATA students from both institutions. During the first semester, this course is primarily lecture-based.

Students may follow any of the non-assessed [workshops on professional development](#) (8h) and they may apply to participate in any of the extracurricular activities offered, such as the [European Centre for Government Transformation](#) and the [Transparency International](#) group.

During this semester, students will also start preparing their thesis proposal on transatlantic affairs and their internship. The thesis will be co-supervised by professors from both institutions.

## Semester 2

In their second semester at the College of Europe, MATA students in the study track “European Political and Governance Studies” follow **4 courses**. They will have the opportunity to apply their knowledge and negotiation skills as part of the compulsory course, “Negotiation and Decision-making in the EU: A Simulation Game”. Additionally, they will choose two optional courses offered by the European Political and Governance Studies Department. They will also continue to follow the joint course on “US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs”. In the second semester, this course is focused on developing a joint project.

### Elective courses:

Students choose to follow any 2 [optional courses](#) offered by the European Political and Governance Studies Department (30h each).

Students will continue to work on their thesis in transatlantic affairs and prepare their internship. Students may follow any of the non-assessed [workshops on professional development](#) (8h).

Students in the MATA programme will also participate in the study trip to Luxembourg and Strasbourg to visit European and international institutions.

## Semester 3

Students will complete **a high-level internship** related to transatlantic affairs of ideally four months, but at minimum three months. Students who start the MATA programme at the College of Europe are expected to do their internship in the United States.

## Semester 4

At The Fletcher School, MATA students in the study track “European Political and Governance Studies” will select **4 courses** (between 26.5h and 32.5h each) from any of the three divisions: International Law and Organizations (ILO); Diplomacy, History and Politics (DHP); and Economics and International Business (EIB). They may also cross-register and substitute one of these four courses by a relevant course from Tufts University or Harvard University.

In early April, students will hand in their **Master’s thesis** on a topic of transatlantic affairs.



## Students starting at The Fletcher School

Students of the MATA programme who choose to spend their first year of studies at The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy will focus to a larger extent on international relations and slightly less on European affairs than those students who begin their studies at the College of Europe.

During the two semesters at The Fletcher School students have to choose at least one course from each of the three divisions ('breadth requirement'): International Law and Organizations (ILO); Diplomacy, History and Politics (DHP); and Economics and International Business (EIB). Some courses are particularly recommended, subject to availability during a semester, since they help prepare students for their study track at the College of Europe.

### Semester 1

At The Fletcher School, MATA students in the study track "European Political and Governance Studies" will follow **3 courses** during the first semester. One of these four courses is the compulsory joint course on "US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs", which is an integral component of all study tracks within the MATA programme and brings together all MATA students from both institutions. During the first semester, this course is primarily lecture-based.

Additionally, they are required to take DHP D283M "U.S.-European Relations since the Fall of the Berlin Wall" and EIB E251: "The Economics of the European Union". The offering of these courses can vary in terms of which semester they are taught. Moreover, if the course is not taught at Fletcher in a given year, a similar course at Harvard should be followed when possible.

Students may choose two courses from those offered at The Fletcher School. They may also cross-register and substitute one course with a relevant course from Tufts University or Harvard University.

#### Compulsory course:

- "US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs" (20h)
- DHP D283M: U.S.–European Relations since the Fall of the Berlin Wall
- EIB E251 The Economics of the European Union

#### Elective courses:

If one or both of the required courses are not offered in the first semester, students can choose to follow elective courses (between 26.5h and 32.5h each), taking into account the 'breadth requirement' and the recommendations below. Recall that a total of three courses must be followed in this semester.

- ILO L221: ACTORS IN GLOBAL GOVERNANCE
- EIB E215: THE ECONOMICS OF PUBLIC POLICY
- DHP P287M: POLITICAL ECONOMY AND BUSINESS OF THE EUROPEAN UNION

During this semester, students will also start preparing their thesis proposal on transatlantic affairs and their internship. The thesis will be co-supervised by professors from both institutions.



## Semester 2

At The Fletcher School, MATA students in the study track “European Political and Governance Studies” will follow **5 courses** during the second semester. They will continue to follow the compulsory joint course on “US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs”. In the second semester, this course is focused on developing a joint project.

If the other required courses, DHP D283M “U.S.-European Relations since the Fall of the Berlin Wall” and EIB E251: “The Economics of the European Union”, were not available during the first semester and are offered the second semester, MATA students are expected to take them at this time. If one or both are not offered during this semester, a comparable course should be followed at Harvard.

Additionally, students choose the rest of their courses from those offered at The Fletcher School or cross-register and substitute one of these courses with a relevant course from Tufts University or Harvard University.

### Compulsory course:

- “US-EU Relations in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Multidisciplinary Analysis of Transatlantic Affairs: project part” (15h)
- DHP D283M “U.S.-European Relations since the Fall of the Berlin Wall” (if not followed during the first semester)
- EIB E251: “The Economics of the European Union” (if not followed during the first semester)

### Elective courses:

Students choose to follow other courses (of between 26.5h and 32.5h each) that will total 5 courses in all (including the compulsory courses), taking into account the ‘breadth requirement’ and the recommendations below.

### Semester 3

In early April, students will have to hand in their **Master's thesis** on a topic of transatlantic affairs.
